Dear Friends.

Welcome to Yolo Food Bank's impact report. It is hard to believe I have been on board for over a year and a half. After countless conversations with you, our supporters, I want to make sure we're keeping you abreast of our progress. When FY 2022-2023 came to a close in July, we saw the highest number of households to ever participate in our public food distributions. And we were able to meet this need thanks to your support!

It was so exciting for our board and staff to begin FY 2022-2023 with a visit from US Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack and First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom. This year our organization received a landmark donation - the largest private gift here at Yolo Food Bank. It also marked a special reunion of one of our most generous partners and funders, the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation, joining us once again for our annual and beloved Thanksgiving food distribution.

My focus this past fiscal year was reconnecting with many of you. While doing so, it confirmed what we all know to be true: when we collaborate as a community we are stronger. With the creation of the Food Bank's Senior Team Work Plan, our service did not skip a beat. Our Board of Directors were reinvigorated to start anew with amended bylaws and recruitment of new board members.

So as I reflect on this past year, I thank every donor and volunteer that supported us. I am especially proud of the fact that we have over 1.800 volunteers who contributed a value of over \$1.1 million in donated time. As we dive into the next fiscal year, I know that Yolo County is a generous community that sticks together, especially when times get tough. Current data tells us that demand for food assistance will persist at record levels, so we must continue to be there for our neighbors in need.

As we tackle food insecurity in FY 2023-2024, we will continue to analyze the communities we serve to ensure a consistent approach to our distributions and partners, while we look at gaps that need to be addressed. The Yolo Food Access survey will be released in winter 2024 and will inform our future work.

Thank you for being there for our community in need.



## **New Initiatives**



### <u>Pop-Up Food Distributions</u>

During summer and fall of 2022, Yolo Food Bank held pop-up food distributions to reach nearly 800 farmworkers and food system workers during the peak migrant farmworker season here in Yolo County. The organization worked in partnership with local farmers Durst Organic Growers, River Garden Farms, Muller Ag and local processing plant Pacific Coast Producers to host food distributions at their respective sites.

Serving primarily Latino populations but also Punjabi populations, it was not only important to source nutritious produce, but to provide culturally relevant food options for these populations. The food boxes distributed at each distribution included vegetables, protein items, shelf-stable pantry items, and other items such as tortillas and/or naan.

# Disaster Relief Grocery Card Effort

In early January of 2023, PG&E activated Yolo Food Bank to provide food assistance to vulnerable Yolo County residents impacted by the series of storms and power outages caused by the atmospheric river.

With the help of more than a dozen partner agencies, a total of 2,625 grocery cards valued at \$40 each were distributed. This effort was critical to individuals who faced everyday food

security concerns, and grocery cards gave community members the ability to purchase replacement food or emergency food that met their dietary and cultural preferences.

### **Bolstering Volunteerism**

This was a transformative year for our volunteers! The first ever Volunteer Town Hall was held, where volunteers had the opportunity to connect and share ideas with food bank staff and board members. We rolled out a new software enhancing the volunteer experience, making it much easier for our volunteers to sign up for opportunities and track their hours. At our annual volunteer appreciation event, we recognized 26 Lifetime Achievement volunteers who gave over 500 hours of service to Yolo Food Bank.

### **Student Farmers Market**

This past spring, Yolo Food Bank rebranded our former Kids Farmers Market program and expanded into local high schools. Our first site at River City High School in West Sacramento was made possible thanks to the generous sponsorship of The Building Owners & Managers Association of Sacramento and the Central Valley (BOMA Sacramento).


Not only were students given 10 lbs of fresh produce, but they attended a culinary demonstration provided by local Chef Greg Desmangles of Urban Roots.

This allowed students to learn about food preparation and nutrition in a way that was both interactive and fun. They even got to take home recipe cards that taught them how to prepare the food they received that day!

This innovative program model will continue to serve preschools and elementary schools. In FY 2023-2024, we intend on expanding to more high schools in an effort to reduce the stigma of food insecurity by normalizing access to free, local food.
